Thanks to Hennie, Elza Miles will be making her way to Richmond to pay tribute to that great son of the Karoo, Jan Schoeman aka Outa Lappies aka The Van Gogh of the Karoo! This is not a talk to be missed!!!

Not to be forgotten are the academics like Marius Crous, Andries Oliphant, Helize van Vuuren and Marianne de Jongh. I always believe writers like JM Coetzee need 'interpreters' before they can be fully appreciated. So be sure not to miss these talks
